

Foreword by the President

n behalf of the Council of the Nigerian Academy of Science, It is a pleasure to present a synopsis of our activities in 2011. So much happened during the course of the year and this is simply a careful selection of some of what we think are the defining events of the year.

The Fellowship has grown with the addition of more distinguished scientists both locally and internationally. In addition, while Professor Adetokunbo Lucas FAS had his Foundation Fellow status restored by the AGM, the former President of the US National Academy of Science (USNAS), Professor Bruce Alberts, was inducted this year - we acknowledge his support for our Academy through the African Science Academy Development Initiative (ASADI) of the USNAS.

At the induction of new Fellows, a public lecture on 'The Changing nature of innovation and its implications for national development', was delivered by the Chief Economic Adviser of Nigeria (at the time), Professor Kassey Garba. She has been of tremendous support to the Academy and we owe her a debt of gratitude.

The Academy received the \$5 million special grant from President Goodluck Jonathan GCFR. This was in fulfilment of the promise earlier made by President Olusegun Obasanjo GCFR and confirmed by our late Grand Patron, President Umaru Musa Yar-Adua GCFR.

There are many more highlights as featured in this report. However, the year 2012 promises even more exciting challenges for the Academy. In particular, we shall be hosting the African academies and other international partner academies and organisations at the 8th annual meeting of African academies. This is to be between the 11th and 15th of November 2012 in Nigeria and will be addressing climate change issues in Africa.

The explosive progress of science and technology up to the 20th century brought prosperity and enriched the quality of life for mankind. It is difficult to predict the 21st century counterparts of quantum theory, the double helix and the internet. However, there is little doubt that advances in science and technology will continue to transform the way we live, create new industries and jobs and enable us to tackle seemingly intractable social and environmental problems. Furthermore, it is the innovation aspect of Science and Technology that makes our life more abundant. It is Science and Technology (S&T) that generates innovative products for the market place. But this takes planning and the results though fundamental are not achievable in short-term.

In that sense, the most pressing problems we face today include harmonizing economic development with global warming; preventing terrorism; controlling infectious diseases and assessing the potential health benefits and ethical factors relating to cloning. These are called the lights and shadows of science and technology.'

As we start the year, may I use this opportunity to thank the Fellows and staff, as well as all our partners around the world for their contributions that made 2011 successful. 1.0 The Nigerian Academy of Science

The Nigerian Academy of Science (NAS) is one of the oldest merit-based academies in sub-Saharan Africa, having been founded in 1977. The Academy has 42 Foundation Fellows, among a total Fellowship of 133 Fellows and 2 Foreign Fellows. The uniqueness of the Academy is the ability to promote scientific excellence as an independent and unbiased body capable of generating evidence-based science advice for the government and other stakeholders.

Being the foremost independent scientific institution in Nigeria, NAS represents the national scientific community on such bodies as the International Council for Science (ICSU), the Inter-Academy Panel (IAP), the Inter-Academy Medical Panel (IAMP) and the Network of African Science Academies (NASAC). NAS also collaborates with other science academies around the world.

1.1 Vision

The vision of the Academy is an improved quality of life for the Nigerian society through the promotion and application of science and technology.

1.2 Mission

The mission of the Academy is to strengthen the nation's ability to deliver the fruits of science to society by the acquisition, growth and dissemination of sound scientific knowledge and facilitation of its use in the solution of major national problems.

1.3 Aims and Objectives

The aims and objectives of the Academy are to promote the growth, acquisition and dissemination of scientific knowledge and to facilitate its use in the solution of major problems of national interest. The Academy does this by:

- Providing advice on specific problems of a scientific or technological nature presented to it by the government and its agencies, as well as by private organizations;
- Bringing to the attention of the government and its agencies problems of national interest that science and technology can help to solve; and
- Establishing and maintaining the highest standards of scientific endeavour and achievement in Nigeria, through:
 - organization of conferences, seminars, workshops and symposia
 - publication of journals and reports
 - recognition of outstanding contributions to science in Nigeria through awards and prizes
 - development of a working relationship with other national and international scientific bodies and academies.


2.2 The Fellowship

The Nigerian Academy of Science is a merit-based organisation into which only a few distinguished scientists may be elected each year. The process of election begins with the nomination of a candidate by an existing Fellow of the Academy. The candidates are then rigorously assessed by the Sectional Committees of the Academy and subsequently, a shortlist of candidates is drafted by the Council. This final shortlist of candidates is presented for election at the Annual General Meeting and successful candidates are then inducted as Fellows of the Academy.

There were 27 new nominations and 16 rollover candidates (from 2010) considered for Fellowship in 2011, of which 16 were recommended to Council by the Sectional Committees. These were considered by the Council and a final shortlist of the 16 candidates was recommended to the 2012 AGM for election.

The Fellowship of the Academy currently consists of 133 Fellows and 2 Foreign Fellows covering all major fields of science, including medicine and engineering. Of the total number, 12 are women. (See appendix for list of Fellows).

2.3 The Secretariat

Two of the staff, Mrs Edawole and Miss Ogieguata, joined the Academy staff in the course of the year; Mrs Edawole had been an intern previously, and was retained having satisfactorily spent her compulsory national service (N.Y.S.C.) year at NAS.

The secretariat building (Academy House, 8A Ransome Kuti Road, University of Lagos, Lagos) was expanded to accommodate the growing staff and activities of the Academy. In expanding, a conference room and three offices were added to the existing building. Some landscaping work was also done while extensive renovation was carried out on the old part of the building. The expansion was achieved through the effort of Professors Oye Ibidapo-Obe FAS and Adetokunbo Sofoluwe FAS.

3.0 Highlights of 2011 Events

3.1 2010 Annual General Meeting

The 35th Annual General Meeting of the Academy was held on Saturday, the 22nd of January 2011 at the AHI Residence, Jibowu, Lagos and had 41 Fellows in attendance.

At the AGM, the auditors' report of NAS accounts was received and the 35th Council (see list above) was inaugurated. Seven distinguished scientists were elected into the Fellowship of NAS as follows:

- (i) **Professor Kaoje Abubakar FAS** A biochemist with particular expertise in enzymology. He was the Minister of Science and Technology at the time of election.
- (ii) **Professor Isaac Adewole FAS** He is the current Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ibadan and a Consultant Obstetrician and Gynaecologist. He is a leading advocate of cervical screening in the country.
- (iii) **Professor Babajide Alo FAS** Professor of Chemistry at the University of Lagos and is a specialist in Organic Chemistry with special interest in Heterocyclic Chemistry and organic toxicants in the environment.
- (iv) **Professor Chinedum Babalola FAS** She is a Professor of Pharmaceutical Chemistry/Pharmacokinetics at the University of Ibadan. Her work has been mainly on drug analysis and pharmacogenetics, in a bid to study how to optimize therapy in black people.
- (v) **Professor Boniface Egboka FAS** Professor Egboka is a Hydrogeologist with educational training at Nsukka-Nigeria and Waterloo-Canada. His interest is in the management of water resources and environmental sustainability.
- (vi) **Professor Obioma Nwaorgu FAS** She is a Professor of Parasitology and has conducted studies to demonstrate the effectiveness of age-related targeted chemotherapy and has worked actively with the Roll Back Malaria Unit of the WHO.
- (vii) **Professor Adetokunbo Sofoluwe FAS** He is the Vice-Chancellor of the University of Lagos and a Professor of Computer Science. His research has been on modelling and numerical solutions of real life problems.

Also at the AGM, Professor Adetokunbo Lucas had his Foundation Fellow status restored. He is a renowned international public health expert, a member of the Institute of Medicine of the US National Academy of Sciences and was granted Knight Grand Cross (First Class) of the Most Admirable Order of Direkgunabhorn by the King of Thailand. He is an Adjunct Professor of International Health at the Harvard University, USA.

3.2 Induction of New Fellows

The above new Fellows of the Academy were inducted at a ceremony held at the Reiz Continental Hotel, Abuja-Nigeria on 12th of May 2011. In attendance were the Honourable Ministers of Agriculture and National Planning, Professor Sheikh Abdullahi and Dr Shamsudeen Usman respectively. The Chairman of the occasion was the Head of Service of the Federation, Professor Oladapo Afolabi.

The induction was preceded by a public lecture on 'The changing nature of innovation and its implications for economic development'. The lecture was delivered by Professor Kassey Garba who

was the Chief Economic Adviser to the President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria.

Also inducted (at a private ceremony in Denver, United States), as a Foreign Fellow of the Nigerian Academy of Science, is Professor Bruce Alberts; this was on the 6th of December 2011. He is a Professor of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and a former President of the United States National Academy of Sciences.


3.4 Public Presentation of Agric-Nutrition Report

Having successfully held a workshop addressing the apparent gap between agriculture and nutrition in the country on the 30th of November and 1st of December 2011, a report of the workshop deliberations was published and disseminated.

Subsequently, a media event to disseminate the contents of the report was held on the 25th of August 2011 in Lagos. At the event, Professor Grace Longe FAS presented briefly the perspective of an agriculturist on linking the two sectors while Professor Tola Atinmo presented a nutritionist's perspective.

The event was well attended by media representatives and stakeholders from the nutrition and agriculture sectors. Also in attendance were Dr Gloria Elemo, the Director-General of the Federal Institute of Industrial Research Oshodi (FIIRO) and the Director-General of the National Space Research and Development Agency (NARSDA), Dr Seidu Mohammed.

3.5 Meeting with National Science Associations

In a bid to foster a closer working relationship with the national science associations in the country, NAS invited the representatives of the associations to a meeting at the NAS secretariat on the 28th of April 2011. The meeting discussed the need to work together to develop science, technology and innovation in the country. The representatives expressed their delight and willingness to collaborate more with NAS as the peak independent scientific body in the country. They also asked that this becomes a regular event that will ensure that the scientific community speaks with one voice to the government.

At the meeting, the ICSU (International Council for Science) National Committee was launched and comprises representatives of the science associations present; it is chaired by Professor Gabriel Ogunmola FAS.

The science associations represented at the meeting are the Botanical Society of Nigeria, Pharmaceutical Society of Nigeria, Association of Public Health Physicians of Nigeria, Nigerian Mining and Geosciences Society, Nigerian Veterinary Association, Nutrition Society of Nigeria, Nigerian Society of Chemical Engineers, Nigerian Society of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, Nigerian Mathematical Society, Nigerian Society of Microbiology, and the Chemical Society of Nigeria.

3.6 Public Lecture on Nigeria's Mineral Resources

As part of the 35th AGM activities, a public lecture was held at the Nigerian Institute of Medical Research (NIMR) on the 21st of January, 201. The lecture, titled 'Nigeria's mineral resources for wealth, industry, infrastructure and life' was delivered by Professor Siyanbola Malomo FAS, the Director-General of the Nigerian Geological Survey Agency.

The lecture, which highlighted the vast mineral resources in Nigeria and their potential use, was chaired by the former Governor of Ondo State, Dr Olusegun Agagu.

4.0 Engaging the Government

4.1 The PREVIEW Project

The 'Policy Research Evidence for Effective Working of Nigerian Health Systems' (PREVIEW) project entails the development of the capacity of policymakers and managers within the Lagos State Health sector to make evidence-based policies. in that regard, the Academy contracted the Health Policy and Research Group (HPRG) of the University of Nsukka to develop training manuals as well as facilitate training workshops and policy retreats. Advisers to the project are Professor Ed 'B Attah FAS and Dr Leke Pitan (former Commissioner of Health in Lagos State).

The first training of policymakers took place on the 22nd and 24th of March 2011 and was followed by a policy retreat (with a focus on malaria control in Lagos State) which was held on the 8th and 9th of June 2011.

The project is funded by the Alliance Health Policy and Systems Research (Alliance HPSR) of the WHO, a successful proposal having been made in response to a joint call by the Alliance HPSR and Wellcome Trust.

4.2 Accreditation of the Agencies of the FMST

The Academy was commissioned by the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology (FMST) to accredit the parastatals/agencies under her jurisdiction. This is in a bid to ensure that the said agencies were fulfilling their mandates and that they are poised to contribute to the transformation agenda of the federal government.

For this, the Academy constituted accreditation teams consisting of experts (Fellows and non-Fellows) who visited the institutions, assessed relevant documents and interviewed staff. In all, 19

agencies were so visited. Subsequently, the team reports were submitted to the NAS secretariat for compilation and submission of a final report to the Ministry.

In all, 9 agencies were given full accreditation (for 5 years); 4 agencies received an interim accreditation for 2 years and 5 got interim accreditation requiring another visit in 1 year.

4.4 AU-TWAS Young Scientists National Award

The second edition of the AU-TWAS Young Scientists National Award, administered by the Academy, was won by Dr Mayowa Owolabi, a neurologist at the University College Hospital, Ibadan and Dr Emmanuel Iyayi of the Department of Chemistry at the Redeemers' University, Mowe. Dr Owolabi and Iyayi won the Earth and Life Sciences and the Basic Sciences Awards respectively. There were 26 entries in all for this year's awards.

The Awards were presented to the winners by the Permanent Secretary of the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology, Dr Dere Awosika, at a ceremony held at the Scientific Equipment Development Institute (SEDI), Enugu, Nigeria on the 9th of September 2011 (African Union Day).

The award entails collaboration with the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology, African Union (AU) and the Academy of Sciences for the Developing World (TWAS). The Awards comprise of \$5000 cash each and a certificate of recognition.

5.0 Engaging the Private Sector

5.1 The Nigeria Science Prize

Although the 6th edition of the prestigious Nigeria Science Prize (\$100,000 cash award) had no winner, there were 26 entries. After a rigorous assessment by the panel of judges and external assessors, it was decided that none of the entries should be awarded the prize in 2011.

The Nigeria Science prize is a product of collaboration between the Nigerian Academy of Science and the Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas (NLNG) Ltd.

5.2 NAS Media Awards

Mr Onche Odeh of the Daily Independent Newspaper was awarded the prestigious NAS Science Print-Journalist of the year prize. Mr Odeh, who is also the President of the Nigerian Association of Science Journalists (NASJ), received his award at a ceremony held at the Sheraton Hotel and Towers in Lagos on the 20th of December 2011. The prize was presented to him by Chief Leo Stan Ekeh,

the Chairman of Zinox Technologies Ltd while Mrs Nonye Onyechi delivered a goodwill message on behalf of Professor Segun Adewoye FAS, the Director-General of the National Agency for Science and Engineering Infrastructure (NASENI). There was no winner for the Science Broadcast-Journalist prize.

The 2011 edition of the NAS Media Awards were supported by Zinox Technologies Ltd, Raw Materials Research and Development Council (RMRDC) and NASENI.

As part of the ceremony, a lecture titled "Making science front page news" was delivered by Mr Diran Onifade, the President of the African Federation of Science Journalists. Mr Onifade is also the Publisher of the Africa Science Technology and Innovation News (AfricaSTI) and a former Vice-President of the World Federation of Science Journalists.

6.0 International Activities

NAS continued to forge ahead in ensuring that the Nigerian science community is appropriately represented at important international science gatherings. The Academy has also continued her effort to build strong relationships with other academies and international institutions. Some highlights of NAS' international engagements are below:

6.1 Partnering with the Ghanaian Academy of Arts and Sciences

Members of the Nigerian Academy of Science and the Ghanaian Academy of Arts and Sciences (GAAS) met on the 7th of April 2011 in Accra, Ghana to discuss collaboration to address issues in the subregion of West Africa. The delegation from NAS, led by the President (Professor Oye Ibidapo-Obe FAS), had been meeting in Accra to plan NAS' hosting of the 8th annual meeting of African academies in November 2012.

Professor Francis Allotey FGA, the President of GAAS, hosted NAS to a dinner meeting where it was decided that mutual areas of interest and possible collaboration will be addressed in a MoU to be signed by both academies in due time. In particular, climate change was considered a topical issue that both academies could start to jointly address.

6.2 7th Annual Conference of African Science Academies

The seventh annual meeting of African science academies and conference was hosted, in Kampala on 13-16 of November 2011, by the Uganda National Academy of Sciences (UNAS). The conference, which was on 'Aid effectiveness in the Africa's health sector', was attended by participants from the continent and the world.

The conference was preceded, on the 13th of November, by an ASADI board meeting where the ASADI-participating African academies made presentations to the ASADI board. This was followed on the next day with a collaborative learning session where participants exchanged knowledge about how to host successful annual meetings of the African academies.

The NAS delegation to the annual meeting comprised the Past President (Professor David Okali FAS), Treasurer (Professor Mosto Onuoha FAS), Foreign Secretary (Professor Olaitan Soyannwo FAS), Executive Secretary (Dr Doyin odubanjo), Dr. Ngozi Azodoh (Deputy Director, Federal Ministry of Health) and two other NAS staff members (Dr. Kike Ogunsulire and Mrs Ife Edawole).

6.3 NASAC General Assembly

The general meeting of NASAC (Network of African Science Academies) was held on the 17th of November 2011. The new NASAC Strategic Plan (2011-2015), developed by a committee led by the NAS President, was adopted at the meeting. The President of NAS, Professor Oye Ibidapo-Obe FAS is the Vice-President of NASAC.

A new programme of collaboration between NASAC (and consequently, the African academies) and the German national academy of science, the Leopoldina, was announced to commence by 2012 and would last for three years.

6.4 ICSU General Assembly

The 30th General Assembly of the International Council for Science (ICSU) was held in Rome, Italy and was hosted at the headquarters of the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) from the 26th to 30th of September 2011. The NAS delegation to the meeting comprised the President, Professor Oye Ibidapo-Obe FAS and Professor Gabriel Ogunmola FAS.

Professor Gabriel Ogunmola, was nominated as a representative of NAS but narrowly lost the bid to become an Ordinary Member of the ICSU Executive Committee due to the voting structure.

6.5 IAMP YPL Conference

The Inter-Academy Medical Panel (IAMP) invited national academies to nominate two young physicians each to attend a Young Physician Leaders workshop in Berlin, Germany on the 21st and 22nd of October 2011; the workshop was to develop their leadership skills via mentoring by an international group of physician-leaders. They also attended the Global Health Summit in Berlin from the 23rd to the 26th of October 2011. In all, 20 young physician-leaders under the age of 40 years were selected globally to attend these meetings. The Nigerian Academy of Science was the only academy which had both her nominees selected to attend the meetings.

The NAS nominees were Dr. Anthony Oyekunle (a member of the Nigerian Young Academy) of the Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife, and Dr. Mayowa Owolabi of the University College Hospital, Ibadan.
